If you have younger children, make sure you reassure them that not everything in their lives will change when you move. They need to be reminded that the core elements of your family and household will stay the same. Try your best to maintain some routines and family traditions.

Plan a special way for your children to say goodbye to friends such as a sleepover, a fun outing, or a small party. Encourage them to get and give out contact information so that staying in touch will be easier.

Finally, be proactive. The more you can find out about your new location before you go, the better. Can you set up a visit to your children's school? Do they have a youth sponsorship program? Is there a fun spot you could visit right away?
